| 30 | FINDINGS OF FACT | |
| 31 | 1 1. On or about May 7, 2017, Long made appl | ication to the Commission for a Reciprocal |
| 32 | Oregon Teaching License. On June 12, 20 | 17, Long's application was deemed |
| 33 | incomplete as Long did not, at the time, h | old an unrestricted Washington State |
| 34 | license. Long's application was scheduled | to be closed as incomplete on September |
| 35 | 5 11, 2017. Additionally, Long's application | was referred to investigations on May 22, |
| 36 | 6 2017, due to affirmative answers to applic | ation character questions. The closure of |
| 37 | 7 Long's application was stayed pending the | outcome of this investigation. Long has |

never been licensed by the Commission, but by statute, the Commission has 1 2 jurisdiction over applicants for licensure and student teaching. 2. On Long's May 7, 2017, application for an Oregon Teaching License, Long answered 3 4 "Yes" to questions 1, 3, 4, 6, 7, and 8 in the Character Questions section. These 5 questions address leaving school-related employment while the subject of an 6 investigation, being placed on leave for alleged misconduct, adverse action on a 7 professional certificate or license, past disciplinary action, and criminal history. As 8 part of Long's application, Long provided written explanations of his "yes" answers 9 to the character questions. Long explained that, "In 2006, I resigned from my 10 position at Tyee Educational Complex after being put under investigation for 11 misconduct. I used stipend coaches funds to pay volunteers who did the stipend 12 coaches job. I deposited the checks of two coaches who stopped coming to work." 13 Long also explained that he had plead guilty to a misdemeanor forgery charge 14 related to the conduct that occurred in 2006. Long further mentioned that the State 15 of Washington had revoked his Washington Teaching Certificate as a result of the 16 conduct occurring in 2006; however, his certificate had been re-attained. 17 18 The Commission conducted an investigation to determine the facts surrounding 19 Long's background and character question answers. According to documents from the Washington office of Professional Practices (OPP), Long's Washington state 20 credentials were revoked on November 5, 2007. This action was taken in part due to 21 22 Long forging the signatures of two assistant coaches and cashing checks made out to 23 them, placing the funds into his own bank accounts. Long plead guilty to amended charges of attempted forgery, a gross misdemeanor. As part of Long's plea 24 25 agreement, Long agreed to the revocation of his Washington state teaching 26 certificate. On February 24, 2009, Long successfully reinstated his Washington state 27 teaching certificate. On April 28, 2014 Washington state suspended Long's 28 Washington state teaching certificate for a period of three months. The suspension 29 was based on a variety of conduct on Long's part including the following: failing to 30 answer pre-employment questions accurately on multiple occasions, falsely 31 answering questions related to an unemployment application, inappropriate conduct
